The Association of Nursing Directors of University Hospitals and Medical Universities in Germany e.V. and the Network of Nursing Science and Practice Development are organizing an online conference on the evening of August 25th, 2022, to discuss and deliberate the subject of worldwide nursing staff situa-tion. The conference is aimed at creating a joint exchange platform with nursing experts and managers from various countries to elicit best practices, lessons learnt and inhibiting factors globally. The main focus of the event is mutual learning from participating countries, in terms of their implementation and structures to counteract the shortage of nurses.

The conference welcomes nursing management at all levels in the clinical setting but limited to a team of six experts from individual participating countries which are Philippines, Tanzania, Germany, USA, Poland and England. The expected contribution from each team is to provide relevant and critical information on their country's health care system, nursing education system, the nursing staff skills matrix (skill mix in nursing care teams), issues and solutions in the clinical setting.

Greetings



Howard Catton, CEO, Internatonal Council of Nurses

On behalf of the International Council of Nurses and our over 130 national nursing association members, thank you for hosting this critically important conference dealing with the global workforce shortage which I believe to be the greatest threat to health in the future. The World Health Organization's State of the World's Nurses reported a shortage of almost six million nurses in 2018. The recent ICNM report, Sustain and Retain in 2022 and Beyond argues that shortages will be exacerbated "because of COVID-19 driven ill health, burnout, absence, reduced working hours, and early retirement". In fact, ICN believes that the nursing shortage could be as many as 13 million in the next few years, unless action is taken now. The pandemic has shown us the centrality of health to all our aspects of life, not just our physical and our mental health, but our ability to be with friends and families, and to live in communities that are safe and cohesive, which also contributes to our happiness, safety and security. The events that we are seeing unfolding across Europe and the Ukraine, as well as the dreadful events in the Tigray, Afghanistan, Myanmar and elsewhere, also show the centrality of nursing and healthcare to our lives, and that health and peace are inseparable. These events have also shown us the terrible toll that the pandemic, wars, conflicts and natural disasters have on our nursing workforce. We have seen high infection rates amongst nurses through the pandemic, at least 180,000 tragic deaths of healthcare workers, enormous mental health, psychological pressures, abuse and violence. We know what we need to do. As the WHO Strategic Directions for Nursing and Midwifery say very clearly, "We must invest in nursing education, nursing jobs, and nursing leadership." ICN in our publication, Invest in Nursing and Respect Rights to Secure Global Health, has added two more objectives: protecting nurses' safety and investing in nurses' health and wellbeing. We include practical actions ries, nurses, and others could taketo put the policy priorities into action. The nursing shortage can no longer be ignored. Now is the time to take action! Thank you to the VPU's Nursing Science and Practice Development Network for highlighting this critical issue. I wish you all a productive discussion.
